


...AND NOTHING BUT THE TRUTH

t first, being on the other side in the civilian world was odd after being in law enforcement for 27 years. Then, things started settling in and I learned that certain humility comes with retirement and I let things be. That was 12 years ago. Just a month ago, I learned a new side of civilian life: being the family of a crime victim.

Someone very close to me, a minor, was molested and, when my wife and I learned of the incident, it was shattering. I have sat across the table with victims of the most horrific crimes imaginable and some not so imaginable. Even while maintaining my professionalism, I've been able to connect – at least in some human way to their loss and their pain. I've answered their phone calls and heard the desperation and hope in their voices: Are you any closer to making an arrest? What's happening with the case? When's the trial? Why haven't we been updated on anything? Is he going to get away with this? Can't he be charged with something more serious?

On May 1st, 1986, Jack Wilcox was murdered in the office trailer of a crane company where he was the manager. They rented heavy equipment and operators to construction crews and road repair companies. It was a difficult case and it remains unsolved to this day. Jack's widow, Frances, called me daily, wanting to know what was happening. Then, the calls tapered off to two or three times a week and then to once a week. And, as the investigation dragged on and cooled, I was pulled off the case to work a series of murders we thought were connected. I could have told Frances we were doing everything we could, every day, but I told her the truth: I was ordered to work on something else and the time I could devote to Jack's case had narrowed considerably. She wasn't happy, but she appreciated me telling her the truth. Frances' calls kept coming, once a month, then once every year on May 1st. To this day, we speak on the phone every May 1st. We talk about family and we know everything about each other's kids and their husbands and wives. She is a friend.

Being a crime victim, or the family of one, is disorienting, frustrating and, sometimes, infuriating. Seeing this loved one of my family suffer with the helplessness and



terror of what happened to her has its own special brand of pain and anger, too. Just several days ago, I made a call to the investigator who is in another state. There had been precious little done on the case and I wanted to light a fire.

"Look," I said, "I spent a good part of my life investigating homicides. I'm not going to interfere or tell you how to do your job, so please understand that. But, I do want to make sure we maximize everything which can be done against this offender."

The investigator was appreciative and I think - I hope - I made enough of an impact on her to keep our case in the forefront. This is one of the problems with police work. You get a case, then another, then another. Ask any burglary or auto theft detective. They can, and sometimes do, become just another case number. That dynamic is different, of course, when it's a murder. When it's a sexual assault, there's always the possibility the victim isn't being truthful or even the greater possibility that physical evidence is nonexistent, in which case you have to rely on statements. Getting statements from witnesses and offenders takes planning, skill and, sometimes, a little luck. You also have to really want to close the case. In homicide, getting motivated was easy, especially if you had been on the scene and looked at the lifeless body of some innocent mom lying face down in a pool of blood because she came in with groceries and surprised a burglar. You don't need anyone to light a fire under your ass in a case like that. Once, the bureau brought in an old-timer who I guess thought he would ride out his last few years in a place which didn't work hard. He had barely been there two weeks when I was discussing with him a witness we were trying to find. He snorted.

"Huh. Tell me, Nyberg, do you *care*?" I stared at him. "Yeah," I said, "I do. So does everyone else who works here."

He was gone after about six months. Being here in the "stands" and not down on the field anymore, you think about all those things and you wonder what's being done; how well it's being done; and, then, how a prosecutor is going to look at it all. I know that many more things can fail than succeed in cases like this, but diligence, and a will to make the case, is key. It's just, well, not in my control anymore.

The ripple effects of a case like this are profound. This victim has brothers, sisters, cousins, aunts and uncles, and parents. *Everyone* has taken a punch to the gut and every day it seems we are trying to get our wind. But, it's *her* this has happened to and none of us can feel what she feels, or how she is trying to move forward, keep up her grades, keep up her smile, and be the great person we all know she is. We have all agreed that our role is support her and do whatever we can to help her heal. Part of that is seeing the handcuffs go on this vermin. As deeply as I want to see that happen, I know what an uphill battle it can be.

If you're an investigator and you're reading this, all I can say is this: Your cases all have case numbers on them, but they're not *just* case numbers. They represent something which happened to someone and has affected that someone for the rest of his (or her) life. And, that thing which happened affected his (or her) entire family as well. Please care about your cases and, if you find one day that you don't, leave the unit you're working in and go do something else.

One day, you might be on the outside looking in, with a loved one sobbing in your arms because some monster decided to take advantage of them. I hope that never happens to you, but, if it does, that badge which says "retired" on it won't help you.

All you will have is hope. P&SN



I have an assignment for you.

rab a piece of paper and a pencil and list all of the training opportunities which are available to you as a supervisor or a manager.

Maybe you can start your list with the nearest ones, such as your own agency. Do they sponsor supervisory or management level training? No? Well, maybe you can put your local regional academy on the list - or maybe you can't. Although I don't know the laws in all the states, I do know that most have no mandatory training standards for police supervisors (last I knew, only eight states do) and I don't know of any state which requires mandatory management training. So, many of you reading this can't list your own department or local police academy as a source. With that, where else can you go to get supervisory and or management level training?

I can't list all of the options for you, but I can tell you that they are out there - maybe through a nearby agency; maybe through training academies in other parts of your state; maybe through academies in other states; maybe through professional associations; maybe through other government agencies; etc. Now, spend some time and complete this assignment. With a little research and a little "outside the box" thinking, I can tell you that there should be a variety of potential sources for you to put on your list. That's the good news.

Making Training Work for You



Now, the "not so good news": Even with a list of a dozen potential sources for your training, there will be limited seminars or classes for police supervisory and police management training for you to attend. Part of that reason may be because (for reasons I don't understand) too many agencies don't see the value in, or the need for, this level of training, so classes and seminars may not be regularly scheduled. Another problem for you may be that the training which is offered isn't close to you, so the travel costs have to be factored in.

Let's assume you have compiled a list of available options which you can potentially attend. How do you take advantage of these opportunities to their maximum potential? Effectively managing your own training schedule throughout your career can dramatically increase your promotability and competence as you outdistance your competition for new career opportunities.

Here are a few tips to help you take charge of your own training program and to maximize its impact on your career.

Make Your Intentions Well Known

There are three steps I have found over the years for getting what you want in your career. The first step: It seems like common sense, but if you want to go somewhere in your career, you have to let someone know where you want to go. If you have a plan, let your bosses know. If you have plans to be upwardly mobile and want a certain path in your career, let it be known and give them a chance to help.

The second step: In order for your agency to "invest" in you, you have to be worthy of the expense. There is a phrase in the business world called "Return on Investment" (ROI). Basically, is the "benefit" worth the "cost"? This is what bosses use to figure out when they decide who should go to certain training classes and who shouldn't. If you want to be sent to management training (or any other type), you have to prove that you are worth the investment. Are you a valuable employee who has proven your worth to the agency? If not, then start!

The third step: What I have found over the years is that "you can't always get what you want." So, if you are not getting what you want out of your agency for your career development, then start taking charge of your own career. Don't wait for your agency to send you to training - go on your own; use your own money; and invest in yourself.

Seek Out Training

Your department will help you meet the minimum required training standards for your state. That includes the "usual" mandatory training programs - firearms, legal updates, OSHA standards - but not supervisory or management training. Of course, you realize that the minimum training standards set by your state isn't even close to what police officers should receive, never mind a command officer

So, as that upwardly mobile command level professional, what options do you have? The list! You have already started the research on your career roadmap. You now know what management level training programs are available from a variety of sources and you know when and where they are offered.

Train Selectively

Once you have identified the list of potential sources, make a progressive plan of the training classes which will be most beneficial to your career in specific order. Look ahead at your career possibilities and see which courses will help you the most to reach your personal and departmental goals. For example, it would make sense to attend a class in basic supervision before requesting

that your agency send you to the FBI National Academy. Planning on your part may allow your agency to take your training requests more seriously.

It would seem that a logical first step would be to make a request through the chain of command for training opportunities within driving distance of your department and/or those which may be low cost or free. List options and details in your request so that the decision-makers will realize that you are serious and that you have done your homework. There may be training being offered across the state (or across the country), but is it realistic that your agency will send you? Use your requests selectively. Also, be selective in the courses or seminars that you request. It might be better to wait for a "quality" training program from the best instructors rather than

waste a training request just to try and get "a day away from the office."

Prepare for Your Training

Once you have selected the best courses for you, mentally prepare yourself to maximize your experience. Prior to going, get as much work cleared from your in-basket and calendar as possible. Clean up as much pending work as you can, delegate appropriately and go to the training class with a clear head and an open mind.

Take Notes

You may think that you can remember everything you hear, but many studies have repeatedly shown that you can't. Writing down key points will help to reinforce the material you are covering. Be sure to write down

the contact information of the instructor, as well as any addresses and phone numbers that are given for additional source material. Your notes will also ensure that you have a record you can refer to months or years later.

Network. Network. Network

Whether the training is strictly for your department, at a regional facility or in another state, take advantage of the networking opportunities. On the breaks, make new contacts and get to know people from other units, departments or agencies. Discuss common issues, share experiences and learn from them during and after class. Be sure to take plenty of your own business cards to distribute and be sure to collect contact information from as many participants as possible. That chance meeting in the classroom could turn into a critical contact for you in the future.

Reread Your Notes

After you have returned to work and have gotten caught up, sit down and reread your notes. You will be surprised to find that they may apply to your current job or specific situation - much more so than it appeared when you were in class. Write a short synopsis of what you learned and how it applies to your department. If appropriate, share it with your bosses, peers and

subordinates. If you have questions about the material in your notes, don't hesitate to contact the instructors.

Document Your Training

Be sure that a copy of the diploma or certificate you received gets sent to your training officer, gets into your personnel file, and gets onto your résumé. Make an extra copy for your own supervisor's rating file for your next performance evaluation. That will help your supervisors to better evaluate you and it might raise your score a bit as well. Also, be sure to keep the originals of any diplomas or certificates in a safe and central location for future use. You never know when you will need those documents as proof of your training on that particular topic.

Enioy the Training Experience

Training classes can provide you with the information you need to stay up-to-date and out of trouble on the job. They can also give you a welcome break from your routine and new perspectives to take back to your unit or department. But, perhaps the greatest value of a planned training program is the expertise you gain to make your job easier. Over time, your effective management of your training will set you apart from your peers and make you more competent and promotable.

There are training opportunities out there for you. Make the most of them.







SEVEN THINGS EVERY CHIEF SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE USE OF FORCE



ou want to enjoy the final product, but you don't want to see either one being made." The part of law enforcement which tends to be the most controversial is the use of force which, at times, has been compared to making sausage.

Today's complex society requires that the professional law enforcement administrator deal with various issues involving the use of force. There are no secrets or magic formulas to address all potential aspects of using force. You may not agree with all "seven things"

addressed in this article as answers for you and your agency. You may want to eliminate a few or add a few. Still, keep an open mind and give serious thought to not reinventing the wheel, but making the wheel go faster and farther.

ALWAYS, the most important thing to consider is the safety of the officers - ALWAYS. It's true that law enforcement is inherently dangerous, but the number one concern for all should be that officers go home at the end of their shift. If officers are expected to sacrifice their personal safety way beyond the call of duty, something is seriously wrong.

Officers still need to do their job and respond to calls for service, but within reasonable parameters. Expecting two officers to wade into a fight at a music concert where hundreds of people are brawling would be ridiculous. Expecting the officers to handle this call with ample backup and the right equipment is entirely reasonable. There is a big difference between bravery and stupidity.

Analyze any use of force incident as "reasonable" in addition to any department policies. Without a doubt, there is no place in law enforcement for brutal officers and policies need to address use of force. It is also possible that an officer may have violated a specific component of a department's use of force policy; for example, using their own pepper spray rather than the department issued one and only authorized spray. If that is the case, it would be a clear violation of the department's use of force policy and the policy violation will need to be investigated and addressed.

A clear violation of department policy, such as the use of the unauthorized canister of personally owned pepper spray, may not equate to violating an individual's rights under the US Constitution or the respective state's constitution. For example, the use of the unauthorized pepper spray, which is a use of force application, may be absolutely reasonable under US standards, state standards and even other provisions of the department's use of force policy. The violation of policy investigation, in addition to reflecting a violation of policy, should also state that there were no apparent violations of anyone's rights under the US Constitution or the state's laws or constitution, if that is the case. The conclusion may be that the officer used a personal can of pepper spray which is definitely a policy violation, but the use of that spray was entirely a reasonable use of force under the circumstances.

The US Supreme Court in the 1989 decision Graham v. Connor (490 U.S. 386) uses the "reasonable" standard based on "the reasonable officer on the scene, rather than with the vision of 20/20 hindsight." The issue of determining the use of force is not what the officer "could have, should have or may have done" but, whether the use of force was within the parameters of reasonable or not.

A plaintiff's attorney may try to base a lawsuit for excessive force on a clear violation of a section of a department's use of force policy as a prima facie case of excessive force. This may not be the case, as brought out in the prior pepper spray use example. Law enforcement administrators should remember that the US Supreme Court stated "that police officers are often forced to make split-second judgments in circumstances that are tense, uncertain and rapidly evolving - about the amount of force that is necessary in a particular situation." The Court also stated that, with the claim of excessive force, the same standard of reasonableness at the moment applies. In essence, not every push or

shove is unreasonable or excessive, even if it may later seem unnecessary in the peace of a judge's chambers."

Keep an open mind to new technologies and training programs. This does not mean that you go along with every new piece of equipment or training program devised. For example, you may recall when SAP gloves, blackjacks and thumbcuffs were still being used by some police and sheriff's department personnel.

Alternately, it took a long time for the semiauto pistol to replace the revolver for most police departments and the use of pepper spray and a TASER® as effective nonlethal force options are still not embraced by all law enforcement agencies.

Training doesn't cost - it pays. Officers use both their training and experience to determine their level of control over a person when using force. If officers are not provided with initial training with any piece of equipment, they are left to fend for themselves and may become injured or they may unwittingly injure a

person they are confronting. Even with a simple piece of equipment, training may seem like a waste of time and money. Using pepper spray is an example where officers should be trained to know when and how to (safely) spray a person; what it can and cannot do; how to assist the person sprayed from the OC's effects, as well as for skill development.

In-service training is also a good idea and some states have mandated a minimum number of required training hours for all officers. Unfortunately, the minimum number of hours frequently becomes the maximum number. Why not go beyond a minimum 24 hour yearly inservice requirement by giving officers 32 hours or 40 hours? In-service training is also a time to make sure that officers have not developed bad habits in areas where they may be injured or unintentionally injure someone else. If bad habits exist, they need to be corrected.

Professional use of force training programs can also save money and anxiety. Officers will not be injured as often; workers' compensation claims will be reduced; complaints to the agency will also be reduced: litigation should diminish; and

your job may just get a tiny bit easier. Ongoing training is also the right thing to do.

Be prepared to deal with the media. Rick Rosenthal is an experienced journalist who conducts training programs throughout the country on media relations. Rosenthal advises, "You should keep in mind that one of the worst comments that can be made to the media following a major use of force incident is 'no comment." The media may report that, "Chief Smith refused to comment." Most media sources are "headline-driven" and the tone of a reporter's voice may imply that the police are closing ranks or covering something up.

Telling media sources something like, "We're thoroughly investigating this incident and for us to speculate would not be fair. We want to be certain that we do everything we can to find out exactly what happened," makes more sense. If you don't feed the sharks, they'll start taking bites out of you!

Don't succumb to pressure. Once you sacrifice your integrity, you are no longer worthy of carrying out your sworn responsibility. Your job is not to be liked by everyone, but you need to be fair while doing it. If an officer is right in doing what he (or she) did in a use of force incident, you need to be able to stand up to attacks by vocal members of the community


with ulterior motives, political pressure or even media attacks.

You should also be able to do what's right if an officer blatantly stepped over the bounds of using proper and reasonable force. If department discipline, employment termination or criminal charges are called for, then they should be dealt with. You should never compromise your integrity.


Never stop learning about use of force. Once you figure out all of the answers, they are sure to change the questions! Be aware of new laws and court decisions and how they may impact your agency. Newsletter, magazine and E-mail subscriptions and memberships in professional organizations can assist you and your staff in making your organization the best it can be.

Not only do you need to be an administrator, but you should also be a leader. Qualify with your handgun, participate in legal updates, and be the first to volunteer for new training techniques. For example, if your agency is conducting TASER recertification training, consider volunteering to feel the TASER's effects in front of the class. The officers' respect for you will grow. P&SN



The number of viral videos of police encounters has skyrocketed in recent years, bringing with it national scrutiny about officer conduct and agency policies.

ome of these videos have justly highlighted improper and unprofessional officer behavior, while others have shown officers acting within their legal authority, but in a way which draws negative public response.

This trend has many officers on their heels, concerned that any slight misstep or misperceived action may be captured on film, propelling them into the unwanted national spotlight.

The reality is that all officers must as-

sume their every action is being recorded. "Everybody has a cell phone and every cell phone has a camera," said Michael Parker during a webinar entitled, Rights and Limitations of the Public and Media to Film Peace Officers, part of American Military University's Law Enforcement Webinar Series.

Parker, who retired after 32 years with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department (LASD), dealt with many crisis situations involving officers being recorded. He was also instrumental in creating the agency's policy on the issue. Parker, who now owns a consulting company, The Parker Group, was joined by Mickey Osterreicher, a lawyer with the National Press Photographers Association. He has 40 years of experience as a photojournalist in print and broadcast, as well as being a uniformed reserve deputy sheriff. Both have provided extensive training to law enforcement agencies and organizations throughout the country.


During the webinar, Parker and Osterreicher provided in-depth information about officer conduct, training requirements, policy development, and the legal and constitutional rights of the public to record police.

Camera? What Camera?

The most important message to officers was to ignore the fact that a person is holding a camera. If someone has the legal right to be somewhere, they likely have the right to be there with a camera in hand. The best thing an officer can do when he (or she) is being recorded is not acknowledge the camera at all, advised Parker. In most cases, officers do not have the legal authority or constitutional right to stop a person from recording them in public. However, officers do have the right and authority to ask a person who is encroaching on a scene, materially interfering with police activity, or putting themselves in harm's way to step away. In order to help avoid a potential lawsuit, officers must be very specific and direct about how they ask a person to move.

Tips on How to Interact When **Being Recorded**

When instructing someone to move away from a scene, officers must be precise with their request. For example, instead of saying "Go away," officers should tell the person to "Step back ten feet and stand on the sidewalk by the tree," said Parker. To be constitutionally sound and less likely to face litigation, an

officer's request must be reasonable in time, place and manner, added Osterreicher. "Articulate where you want them to go; you can't just send them completely away," he said. "Saying 'go away' by itself without any clear direction is going to get you in trouble."

Just as officers can't stop someone from recording them, they also can't stop others being recorded or photographed either. If an event - like a homicide or car accident - happens in a public space, there's nothing an officer can do to stop others from recording it. "You can try appealing to the photographer to have dignity for the family, but they don't have to cooperate," said Parker.

Officers can create a scene perimeter, but they can't ask someone with a camera to step further back than anyone else. When it comes to protecting victims or witnesses from being recorded against their wishes, the only thing officers can do is move that person to a nonpublic place, such as inside a patrol car or take them to the station. Officers cannot order a person to stop filming or photographing - no matter how sensitive a scene.

Find Yourself Being Recorded? **Be Boring**

When an officer is being recorded, they should aim to be calm and unemotional while being direct and specific. "The more boring you are in their video, the less likely you are to become a negative YouTube star," Parker said. Unfortunately, there are people out there who try to incite officers in an attempt to produce a viral video.

In the heat of the moment, this can be difficult. That's where training comes in. Parker encourages agencies to conduct training scenarios where officers rehearse ways to speak to someone recording them. "The biggest challenge for officers is getting this guy out of the way without looking bad on video," said Parker. "Officers need to know not only how to do the right thing, but they need to look good while doing it." That takes practice and officers shouldn't wait until they find themselves in such a situation to test out these techniques.

In addition to training, officers need to have each other's backs during these situations. One example Parker highlighted was a video of a young officer asking a cameraman to stop recording her. She was becoming aggravated by the cameraman's refusal when a sergeant came over and simply tapped her on the shoulder. The officer turned

away and ignored the camera. "Nothing else happened, but this could have easily taken a bad turn," said Parker. "That sergeant was able to defuse the situation with nonverbal communication. How many careers have been saved by a partner's hand on another's shoulder offering a reality check to back off?"

And, while it seems obvious, it's important to note that officers should never seize a camera or view its contents without permission or a warrant, "There are no circumstances when a camera's contents should be deleted or destroyed." said Osterreicher, quoting a U.S. Department of Justice directive. "That is basically seizing and destroying without due process and it will be problematic for officers."


Steps to Creating a Policy

To accompany training, all agencies should have a specific policy which addresses the public's rights and limitations to recording, as well as officer conduct when being recorded. For example, the LASD's policy clearly states that officers should not order a person to cease such activity, demand a person's identification, or demand the person state why he (or she) is taking pictures or recording. All of those demands violate a person's constitutional rights and could possibly lead to litigation.


The LASD worked with Parker, Lt. Eric Lasko, Constitutional Policing Advisor attorneys, representative unions, Mickey Osterreicher, and others to develop their policy. The Civil Rights Division of the U.S. Department of Justice added input and agreed with the LASD policy now in effect. When developing policy and training, Parker and Osterreicher also encouraged officers to review landmark cases on this topic, including Baltimore v. Sharp, Glik v. Cunniffe and Garcia v. Montgomery.

During the webinar, Parker and Osterreicher covered several other important topics, including qualified immunity. exigent circumstances and other examples of constitutional principles to aid officers. P&SN

WHAT'S HOT FROM SHOT?

The 28th Annual Roundup Covering New Firearms of Most Interest to Law Enforcement

he SHOT Show is indeed the world's largest gun carnival. Manufacturers, both large and small, come together to showcase their product lines and introduce new offerings. In recent years, there has been a greater emphasis on products geared to the tactical market and there is no better place to check out new firearms, ammunition lines and accessories than the SHOT Show.

This year's event took place on January 22-25, 2019, and was held in the Sands Convention Center in Las Vegas, Nevada. Exhibits were spread out over three floors, including two huge exhibit halls and a number of smaller ballrooms. I was also fortunate to get to Industry Day at the Range just prior to the show, where I was able to get hands-on experience with some of the new firearms.

The SHOT Show is so huge that I had to confine my hard touring to firearms and other products suitable for police applications. As in recent years, there really wasn't much in the way of new service-size handguns, rifles and shotguns, but, rather, variations on proven platforms which can

fill a useful niche. There are, however, a few exciting developments in small guns designed for concealed carry.

It has become very clear that the 9mm Parabellum and pistols chambered for this classic cartridge are once again king of the hill. Twenty years ago, many experts predicted the .40S&W would soon render the 9mm obsolete, but it didn't play out that way. I can't help but note that many new designs are 9mm only – with no .40S&W option available.

As in recent years, I couldn't even begin to count the number of companies turning out Stoner pattern AR rifles. (Eugene Stoner was the firearms designer who is most associated with the development of the AR-15.) Rifles of every possible configuration, along with different chamberings, are available from a number of sources. There seems to be renewed interest in law enforcement for 9mm AR pattern carbines with several companies offering a contender. Several designs were crafted to accept the very prolific GLOCK® 9mm magazine.

Let's take a look at a few different products from a number of well-known

manufacturers. There just might be something here for you.

Beretta USA Corp.

(berettadefensetechnologies.com)

Beretta was the last of the major manufacturers to offer a polymer frame, striker fired pistol, but their APX is one of the best. The full-size APX was launched two years ago and it was inevitable that Beretta would be turning out a smaller variant better suited for plainclothes carry. As luck would have it, Beretta is now offering two slightly downsized pistols – the APX Compact and the APX Centurion.

Both pistols boast the same desirable features as the original APX, including low bore axis, serialized chassis, ambidextrous slide catch, reversible magazine release, and aggressive slide serrations. The trigger breaks when about six pounds of rearward pressure is applied and it features an audible reset.

The APX Compact features a slightly reduced length and height for better concealment qualities. A full-size grip frame is mated to a reduced length slide and barrel to create the APX Centurion. Both pistols are available in 9mm and .40S&W.

The Beretta 92 remains one of the most popular DA pistols of all time. This year, Beretta introduced a few new variants of the M92A3, a highly refined version of a classic pistol. The M92A3 pistol is equipped with the ergonomic Vertec grip, an oversized reversible magazine release, a three slot Picatinny rail, and a removable front sight. Unlike the original M92, the slide mounted lever is a decocker only. The M92A3 wears a hyper-resistant FDE finish and is available in black/grey, black/green, and flat earth/black.



Colt's Manufacturing Co., LLC

Despite the fact that self-loading pistols dominate the law enforcement market, snub revolvers are still commonly encountered. A few years ago, Colt introduced the Cobra, an all stainless steel snub which has played very well to revolver fans. This year, Colt is back with the King Cobra.

While the Cobra is chambered for the .38 Special, the new King Cobra has upped the ante to .357 Magnum. Truth be told, I'm not especially keen for the .357 Magnum in a two inch barrel as the short tube diminishes velocity and energy and exacerbates muzzle blast. The King Cobra sports a heavy three inch, fully lugged bar-

rel which helps tame muzzle flip and boost terminal performance.

The King Cobra comes with a set of soft rubber grips which helps diminish felt recoil. Sights consist of a fixed rear notch and a black blade front with a brass bead insert. The front sight is pinned in place and it would be an easy task to retrofit an aftermarket unit more to your liking. The DA trigger pull was very nice with a slight stacking at the rear of the stroke, typical of Colt revolvers.

top-shelf. Of late, CZ-USA has taken a more proactive approach to law enforcement sales and the new P-10 F is likely to develop a following all its own.

Where the P-10 C is a compact-size pistol, the P-10 F has been upsized to true service pistol dimensions. One of the attributes of the original pistol was its superb trigger action and the P-10 F follows this same blueprint. This polymer frame, striker fired pistol has one of the best triggers in its class and trips when 4.5 to five pounds of rearward pressure is applied. It also features a short, positive reset.

Capacity of the P-10 F is a very generous 19+1 rounds of 9mm ammunition. With little effort, one can swap the magazine release from the left side to the right side of the grip frame. Three dot sights are standard and the ergonomic grip is well suited to a wide range of hand sizes. Optics and suppressor ready versions of the P-10 F will also be available.

FN® America, LLC

(fnamerica.com)

The FN 509® Series is one of the better striker fired, polymer frame designs to hit



the market and a few new variants have recently been introduced.

Compact pistols for either uniform or concealed carry continue to make a great deal of sense and the new FN 509 Midsize is one of the best. This 9mm pistol features a slightly abbreviated grip frame mated to a four inch barrel and comes with fully ambidextrous controls. Both fixed luminescent sights and tritium night sights are available. The 509 Midsize ships with 15 round magazines, although higher capacity units for the full-size 509 will work with a sleeve. Two interchangeable backstraps to optimize hand fit are included. The trigger weight runs between 5.5 pounds and 7.5

Moving up the ladder, we have the FN 509 Tactical which is an extension of the FN pistol submitted for the US Army Modular Handgun Trials, but it includes some significant improvements. A Low Profile Optics Mounting System allows the fitting of more than ten different red dot systems which cowitness the suppressor height night sights. The cold forged 4.5 inch barrel is threaded to accept most 9mm suppressors. A thread cap with an integrated O-ring protects the muzzle when the suppressor is not utilized. Magazines with capacities of ten, 17 and 24 rounds are available.

GLOCK®, Inc.

(us.glock.com)

Without question, the most talked about pistols at the 2019 SHOT Show were the G43X and G48. Both pistols accept a ten round, single stack magazine and are especially well-suited to a wide range of on and off duty law enforcement missions.

The original G43 9mm has been an overwhelming success and over a million copies have already been produced. It

Test firing the G43X and G48 verified that they are both as good as expected.

is indeed a first-rate, deep concealment pistol, but the qualities which make it so easy to hide often make it a challenge to shoot to a high standard. In a cruel and unforgiving operational environment, many cops have voiced concerns about

the G43's limited magazine capacity. With the new G43X, you can have your cake and eat it, too. By extending the grip a mere fraction of an inch, GLOCK has given us an 11 shot pistol which can still be easily concealed. The slight extension of the grip frame will enhance hit potential for most shooters.

The slide length and width of the G43X are the same as the original G43. The grip frame is just a hair wider and holsters intended for the G43 may, in fact, work with the G43X, depending on the cut.

I, for one, was particularly taken with the G48. For years, there has been a hue and cry for a single stack pistol which approximates the external dimensions of the G19, but in a slightly thinner package. The G48 is, in fact, that gun. The slide and frame width are thin and the same as the G43X. Reducing grip circumference will play huge dividends to shooters with smaller hands. The sight radius and barrel length mirror that of the G19 to make the hits come very easy.

The finish on the first production G43X and G48 is durable silver nPVD. I would expect basic black to follow sometime in

the future. Other notable features include the GLOCK Marksman barrel, reversible magazine catch, built-in beavertail, and fore and aft slide serrations.

I had an opportunity to fire both the G43X and G48 and they did, in fact, live up to the hype. Sight options included the standard white outline rear and dot front, plus a set of night sights from AmeriGlo® which featured an easy to read red dot front which I came to prefer. Performance-wise, I feel that I would be giving up little or nothing with the G48 when compared to the G19 I've carried for years.

By all means, don't overlook the G45 9mm pistol. This is yet another spin on the crossover concept which combines the service length grip from that of the G17 with the shorter slide of the G19X. Contrary to popular opinion, the G45 is not a G19X rendered in black. Gone are the lanyard ring and the extension to the front strap just forward of the magazine well. This reduces the likelihood of pinching the hand during a quick reload. The G45 enjoys all of the benefits of the GEN5 GLOCK family and has much to offer.

Kimber Mfg., Inc.

(kimberamerica.com)

Three years ago, Kimber took a huge gamble and introduced the K6s[™] line of .357 Magnum revolvers. New this year is a double-/single-action variant with an external hammer.

However, the big buzz over at Kimber was the introduction of the EVO line of subcompact 9mm pistols. The EVO represents Kimber's latest effort at marketing a premium quality hideout pistol.

Several different EVO models are available and one can select from different finishes, sight options and grip panels. My favorite was the EVO SP TLE (Tactical Law Enforcement) which includes features such as a beveled magazine well, a match-grade barrel and TRUGLO® Tritium PRO sights. G10 grip panels are standard and the backstrap has an aggressive slant checking for a positive purchase.

The slide of the EVO pistol is made of stainless steel, while the frame is crafted from aluminum. The finish is a durable FNC black. With an unloaded weight of 19 ounces and total length of 6.01 inches, the EVO should be easy to hide and carry. The total capacity is 7+1 rounds.

I had the opportunity to fire a couple of different versions of the EVO and it is a solid performer. If you're in the market for a sharp-looking, premium quality hideout, check out the Kimber EVO.

O.F. Mossberg & Sons

(mossberg.com)

Mossberg pulled off one of the bigger surprises this year with the introduction of an entirely new discreet carry pistol. The Mossberg MC1sc is a subcompact design ideally suited for low profile carry. With so many offerings from well-established manufacturers available, it was very clear that Mossberg would have to develop a first rate product to gain any meaningful trac-



tion. From the looks of it, it appears they have done just that.

The MC1sc is a small striker fired pistol with a 3.4 inch barrel and a total length of 6.25 inches. Unloaded, it tips the scales at 19 ounces. Ergonomics are very good and the grip features a palm swell and aggressive texturing. Three dot sights are standard and TRUGLO Tritium PRO Sights and a Viridian laser will be available as options. Both a six shot and seven shot magazines are standard.

At the Industry Day shoot, I had an opportunity to try out the MC1sc and it delivered the goods. The flat profile trigger with blade safety tripped a shot when about six pounds of rearward pressure was applied. This is on par with just about all striker fired, polymer frame pistols and holds no surprise. For a lightweight pistol, comfort levels were very good in rapid fire and the hits came easy.



The 590° Shock 'n' Saw has an overall length of 26.37 inches.

On the shotgun side, Mossberg is now offering three new 12-gauge 590° Shockwave variants for the 2019 model year, including the 590 Shock 'n' Saw. This is a six shot, (non-NFA) pump-action 12-gauge firearm with a 14 inch barrel featuring a breacher muzzle; a black anodized receiver; a matte black barrel and magazine tube; Shockwave Technologies' Raptor® polymer bird's head grip; an aluminum M-LOK® equipped forend; and a Mossberg chainsaw foregrip.

Remington®

(remington.com)

The Remington 870 pump shotgun has been in production for almost 70 years and remains the most popular gun of its type with law enforcement agencies. Just when you thought Remington had all of the bases covered, they have come out with a new variant of the 870 which fills a useful niche.

The Remington 870 Tactical Side Folder features 6+1 capacity; an interchangeable Rem Choke tube; an 18½ inch barrel; and, as the name implies, a folding stock which can reduce total length by 11 inches. This is a very nice touch in today's smaller patrol vehicles, where space is at a premium or when riding on ATVs or in boats.

In the past, Remington offered an 870 with a top folding steel stock which

proved very uncomfortable after firing just a few rounds. On the new Tactical Folders, the VERASA MAX® soft touch adjustable cheek piece and SuperCell + recoil pad promise to change all that. Both 12- and 20-gauge models are available. If Remington were to offer an LE only Tactical Side Folder with a 14 inch barrel, they would really be on to something.

Recently, a class of short barrel weapons which fire shot shells through a traditional shotgun action has emerged. Oddly enough, they are not classified as shotguns by BATFE, but rather firearms and do not require a tax stamp for private ownership. To date, just about all of these guns have been based on an existing pump-action shotgun.

Enter the Remington V3 Tac-13 which is an autoloading design. The V3 Tac-13 is equipped with a bird's head grip and a 13 inch cylinder bore barrel and all metal surfaces are finished in a business-like black oxide. The Versaport gas system helps control recoil and a strap on the fore grip helps keep the muzzle in check.


For me, the V3 Tac-13 makes more sense than the pump-action designs which are awkward to operate without a shoulder stock. I don't see it as a general purpose weapon, but it can fill a useful role in special circumstances.

SIG SAUER®

(sigsauer.com)

The hot ticket at the SIG SAUER exhibit was the introduction of the P320 XCompact. The XSeries 320 pistols offer a number of upgrades which are incorporated into the new XCompact. They include a redesigned polymer frame with a fastback carry cut and a high profile internal magwell for fumble-free reloads. The slide features prominent serrations for easier manipulation. A SIG X-Ray3 day/night front sight is mated to a SIGLITE night sight plate and the optics ready unit is compati-

ble with Romeo1Pro, Romeo2, and Deltapoint red dots.

The micro-compact SIG SAUER P365 was the belle of the ball at last year's show and continues to be a hot ticket. SIG has introduced a P365 with a manual safety to further broaden its appeal. Small guns, like the P365, are often carried in an Appendix Inside the WaistBand (AIWB) holster and including a manual safety option can mitigate concerns about unintentional discharge while drawing or reholstering.

Smith & Wesson®

(smith-wesson.com)

New from Smith & Wesson are a couple of variants based on their hugely successful Shield® theme. This small single stack blends in easily with soft clothes and is easy to hide, and succeeds in striking the ideal balance between concealability and user-friendly shooting qualities.

The latest variation of the Shield includes ported models in 9mm, .40S&W and .45ACP. A series of ports run the length of the barrel and slide and vent hot gasses upward to reduce muzzle flip for faster follow-up shots. Sight options include tritium or an easy to read fiber-optic.

Springfield Armory®

(springfield-armory.com)

Springfield Armory continues to expand their line of concealable handguns and has expanded their line of single-action and traditional double-action offerings. On the extreme opposite end of the scale, they have also added a real heavy hitter with a 10mm copy of their XD(M)® striker fired pistol.

The Springfield Armory 911 in .380ACP made its debut last year and immediately attracted a great deal of attention. Controls, as well as the single-action trigger, will be familiar to shooters who are comfortable with the classic 1911 pistol. Brand-new is an upsized version chambered for the industry standard 9mm. External dimensions are slightly larger and there is a slightly bigger bump and muzzle rise compared to the .380ACP copy. However, I would consider this to be more than a fair tradeoff. The 9mm copy shouldn't be any more difficult





to hide and terminal performance of 9mm exceeds .380ACP by a wide margin.

Additional models of the traditional double-action XD-E have also come online. Not everybody is comfortable with single-actions and cocked and locked carry and, in fact, many departments forbid it. The hammer fired XD-E presents an alternative in a pistol ideally suited for covert carry. It is available in three barrel lengths, including 3.3, 3.8 and 4.5 inches.

Thirty years ago, the 10mm cartridge had its moment in the sun and was promoted as the ideal law enforcement cartridge. The FBI adopted the 10mm cartridge, albeit in a reduced power format, but its tenure was short lived. The development of the .40S&W cartridge which mirrored FBI-spec 10mm performance and could be fired from a 9mm-size pistol, sealed its fate.

Springfield Armory's XD(M) 10mm pistol is available with a 4.5 inch and 5.25 inch

barrel. The 4.5 inch specimen I checked out was equipped with a red fiber-optic front sight and felt very good in the hand. Even when harboring 15 round magazines, grip circumference is reasonable. Felt recoil was no more than .45ACP and the XD(M) handles both mid- and full-power 10mm loads.

Presently, the 10mm is enjoying a renaissance with outdoorsmen. Might such a pistol serve double duty for rural officers who may have to put down large animals? Pistols chambered for 10mm are often encountered in northern latitudes where officers may have to deal with large bears. The double duty XD(M) might be a great choice.

Another new addition to the extensive Springfield Armory line is the SAINT™ Edge 5.56mm pistol. The AR pattern Edge pistol includes many of the in-demand features initially offered with the SAINT line of rifles and it is a very formidable delivery system in

a handy, compact package.

The Edge is built on a machined lower receiver from aircraft-grade billet aluminum and feature Springfield Armory's proprietary adjustable tension Accu-Tite™ system to minimize play between the upper and lower receivers. The bolt group is coated with tough wearing Melonite and the bolt itself is crafted from premium steel superior to MIL-SPEC. To keep external dimensions at a minimum, the barrel measures a short 10.3 inches and has a 1:8 rate of twist.



The new AR pattern Edge pistol measures only 24.6 inches with its brace collapsed.

Other nice touches include a crisp, short, reset trigger; flip-up sights; and a slim free-float aluminum handguard for the mounting of accessories. A Maxim Defense CQB adjustable pistol brace reduces size, aids accuracy and helps control recoil. With the brace collapsed, the Edge measures 24.6 inches, ideal for working tight spots.

Steyr Arms, Inc.

(steyr-arms.com)

For almost 20 years, Steyr has manufactured some pretty slick striker fired pistols. Built on a polymer frame, these pistols have evolved into a system which can compete favorably with anything else out there. Unfortunately, they have been



largely ignored by the law enforcement community and that is our loss.

My modest collection includes a Steyr L9-A1 service pistol which comes very close to being the ultimate 9mm bullet launcher. Although it remains a cut above, there are a few areas which could be improved upon. That has all been addressed with the latest evolution of the Steyr pistol.

My L9-A1 is a rare bird in that its well-designed grip accommodates a wide range of hand sizes. The new L9-A2 MF takes the concept one step further by offering interchangeable grip panels in addition to different size backstraps. Through a little trial and error, the end user can optimize fit to the hand. Another improvement over the L9-A1 is a flared magazine well. The L9-A2 MF has just enough angle to expedite quick insertion of a fresh magazine. My Stevr L9-A1 boasts one of the best trigger actions to be found in a striker fired pistol and the L9-A2 MF remains true to this code. Stevr's unique trapezoidal sights are standard, but tritium sights will be available as a factory option. P&SN
